FROM STRAIGHT TO TEXTURED!

The grass is always greener on the other side, which is why women with straight hair are often longing for texture. For the 411 on going from sleek to swirly, we spoke with Edmondo Blando, owner of Salon Vanity in Philadelphia, PA.

Consider a chemical texture service...and you needn't worry about ending up with an '80s-style poodle-perm. "Experienced stylists can create modern, romantic, soft looks for even the straightest of hair."

Try thermal heat, i.e., a flat iron, hot curlers or a curling iron. However, Blando warns against using high heat or too much flat-ironing before curling, which can lead to damage.

"When using thermal heat, start curling from the middle of the hair shaft, gently wrapping it around the barrel for a short time," Blando says. "Never start at the ends and roll the barrel up—this will damage ends, result in stiff curls and pull the hair."

Thermal protectant can save strands from too much heat, while volumizer adds fullness. Invest in a flat curling iron with ceramic plates and beveled edges, which are gentler on locks.

If you'd rather avoid heat or chemical styling, look to the past and try pin curls: "Apply styling mousse, then pin hair up to form curls; allow to dry."
